

Survey for the children

This survey is designed to support ongoing observation of preschool children and to capture the children's point of view. Regular reflection after each lesson project is important, as it helps teachers better understand children's experiences, engagement, and learning processes in real time. In addition, a final reflection after all four lesson projects provides a broader overview of children's development, interests, and overall participation from their perspective.

The survey is picture-based to ensure it is accessible and child-friendly for preschool learners. The teacher asks all questions in the children's mother tongue. For the first set of questions, children respond by physically moving to the picture that best represents their answer (e.g., yes/no or emotional responses). This makes the process interactive, concrete, and developmentally appropriate.

After the initial responses, the teacher follows up with additional open-ended questions, also asked in the mother tongue, to deepen understanding and encourage children to express their thoughts more freely. These follow-up questions are guided by the teacher and supported through conversation, observation, and gentle prompting where needed.

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Survey after each lesson project:

1. Did you like this project?

answer with emoticons - walking to thumbs up / so-so / thumbs down

Follow-up (open-ended):

- What did you like about it?
- Can you show me your favourite part?

2. What did you enjoy most today?

answer by going to one of the following pictures: song / story / game / activity, the variety depends on what was going on during the project

Follow-up (open-ended):

- Why did you choose that?
- What happened there?

3. Was anything difficult or tricky?

answer by going to thumbs up / so-so / thumbs down

Follow-up (open-ended):

- What was tricky?
- Can you show or tell me?

4. How did you like the meetings with the children from another country?

answer by going to one of the emoticons: happy / so-so / sad

Follow-up:

Why? What did you like the most? What didn't you like? How did you feel?

5. Would you like to cooperate with the children from another country again?

answer - emoticons

Follow-up:

Why? Why not?

Survey after all four lesson projects:

Which project did you like the most?

answer - go to one of the photos: Be yourself / Homes and houses / Water / Friendship

Follow-up:

- What did you like the most in this project?
- Was there anything interesting? What/Why?

Which project was the most difficult?

answer - go to one of the photos: Be yourself / Homes and houses / Water / Friendship

Follow-up:

- What was difficult?

How did you like the meetings with the children from another country?

answer - go to one of the emoticons: happy / so-so / sad

Follow-up:

- Why?
- What did you like the most?
- What didn't you like?
- How did you feel?

Would you like to cooperate with the children from another country again?

answer - emoticons

Follow-up:

- Why? Why not?
